# THE FRENCH CONSULATE, SAN FRANCISCO PUBLIC LIBRARY, SFMOMA AND KQED TEAM UP TO PRESENT THE SECOND NIGHT OF IDEAS IN SAN FRANCISCO ON FEBRUARY 1, 2020

## FREE event features speakers from more than 30 Bay Area organizations and a live broadcast of KQED's Forum with Mina Kim

SAN FRANCISCO, CA (January 8, 2019) — The French Consulate in San Francisco, San Francisco Public Library (SFPL), San Francisco Museum of Modern Art (SFMOMA) and KQED jointly announce the second San Francisco edition of the global marathon event *Night of Ideas* on February 1, 2020, from 7 p.m. to 2 a.m. at the San Francisco Main Library. Presented in collaboration with the City of San Francisco and a vibrant ecosystem of local cultural, science, tech and academic partners, this FREE seven-hour marathon of debates, keynotes, panels, performances, screenings, music and a special live broadcast of KQED's *Forum* with host Mina Kim features top thinkers from San Francisco and beyond. Its format is designed to spur dialogue and participation on the 2020 theme *Living on the Edge*, an adaptation of the international theme *Être vivant*.

With keynotes, panels and presentations by more than 30 organizations and diverse voices, the second San Francisco edition of *Night of Ideas* expects thousands to participate in the evening's exchange of ideas and creative dialogue. More than 6,000 people attended the inaugural event at the Main Library in 2019.

Multiple stages throughout the Main Library will host concurrent programming, screenings, breakout sessions and opportunities for engagement and debate amongst the attendees. More than 30 topics relating to *Living on the Edge* will be explored over the course of the evening with each of the Main Library's floors devoted to a separate theme including: Chaos + Creation, Wonder + Worry, Exclusion + Belonging, Truth + Doubt and Circulation + Borders. The atrium will host Sights + Sounds, a series of performances over the course of the evening including circus artists, DJ sets, drag performances and music. Our ambition is to envision together new ways of creating dialogue and sharing ideas, because it is essential to not only speak to people, but to also speak *with* them. This is what the *Night of Ideas* is all about."

In a sometimes fraught and divisive time, we need more places where people can come together as a community, to listen, participate and connect around ideas and culture. Through our extraordinary partners, the San Francisco Public Library, KQED and the French Consulate, *Night of Ideas* is a celebration of the vibrant ecosystem of the city and its people," said Neal Benezra, the Helen and Charles Schwab Director of SFMOMA.

"I hope everyone marks their calendar, because, on February 1, the Main Library will be the place to be. Last year's *Night of Ideas* was a tremendous success; this one promises to be even more amazing. We can't wait for the public to experience the Main like they've never experienced it before and to have an opportunity to commune with leading artists, scholars and thinkers from the Bay Area and beyond. Co-produced in the United States by the Cultural Services of the French Embassy, the Institut Français and local partners, *Night of Ideas* has been presented in New York City since 2015 and in Los Angeles since 2017. Last year, more than 7,000 guests attended *Night of Ideas* at the Brooklyn Public Library in New York and more than 6,000

attended the inaugural event in San Francisco. This year, *Night of Ideas* begins in <u>Paris</u> on Jan. 30, 2020 and will be presented in more than 150 cities around the world. The 2020 U.S. cities are:

#### NIGHT OF IDEAS PROGRAM OF EVENTS



With a marathon of philosophical debates, keynotes, panels, open mics, interactive experiences and performances, *Night of Ideas* is designed to spur dialogue and creative participation amongst panelists and attendees on the theme *Living on the Edge*. The evening will ask participants to consider a world balanced on immense challenges and even grander possibilities – how will we reckon with these tensions and use them to create new visions for how we live together going forward?

Using a new format this year, each floor of the Main Library will be devoted to a separate theme exploring the different edges on which contemporary life in the Bay Area balances:

Chaos + Creation – how do we cope with disorder and disruption to fashion new ways to think and be?

- Features a special two-hour live broadcast of KQED's *Forum* hosted by Mina Kim, and a keynote by science fiction artist, filmmaker, inventor and body architect Lucy McCrae.
- A panel exploring catastrophe through artists and history will be offered by the Townsend Centre for Humanities, UC Berkeley.
- Enjoy a live performance by pioneering Afro-Jazz, urban funk band Idris Ackamoor and the Pyramids.

**Wonder + Worry** [Floor 2] – what anxieties about the future weigh on us the most and what fascinations will transform the way we live?

- Speakers include Isha Clark, youth climate activist, author and naturalist Obi Kaufmann, and renowned performance artist and founder of the Media Project: Theater for Incarcerated Women and Mayor's Art Award recipient Rhodessa Jones.
- Play a participatory interactive game animated by the Institute for the Future.
- Watch short films followed by filmmaker talks presented by California Humanities.

**Exclusion + Belonging** [Floor 3] – how do we find belonging and identity while making space for differences of lived experience?

- Speakers include Reverend Deborah Lee of the Interfaith Movement for Human Integrity.
- Two panels curated by French media L'Obs on transhumanism and artificial intelligence.
- Keynote address by Dominique Nora, editor-in-chief of the French magazine L'Obs.
- Enjoy a performance by Black Benatar's Black Magic Cabaret featuring local Trans artists of color.

**Truth + Doubt** [Floor 4] — with consensus about history and facts increasingly fractured, what narratives should we affirm?

- Speakers include Pulitzer Prize—winning historian T.J. Stiles.
- Panels on Fake News curated by French Tech San Francisco.
- Kathryn Olmsted will give a keynote on the destabilization of truth by conspiracy theories.
- Participate in an interactive workshop "Don't deepfake me!" by the European cluster Eunic Silicon Valley.

**Circulation + Borders** [Floor 5] – how do we transcend limits on movement for a healthy economy and a just society?

- Speakers include Barbara Belvisi of Intersellar Lab and artist Caleb Duarte.
- Panel "Transportation: the future of the 3<sup>rd</sup> dimension in the city" presented by World Economic Forum.
- Readings and talks by American poets and writers curated by the French magazine *America* and its French editor-in-chief, Julien Bisson.

Performances will be interspersed throughout the night. Food and drink will be available for purchase. The evening culminates with a midnight performance by Noise Pop, DJs and dancing in the Atrium, and bingo/drag performances with free giveaways hosted by the Stud Collective.

*Night of Ideas* is free to the public but guests must register online on Eventbrite to guarantee a spot. The doors of the Main Library at 100 Larkin Street (between Grove and Fulton Streets) and Fulton Street (between Hyde and Larkin Streets) will open at 7 p.m. for check in. Seven hours of programming will conclude at 2 a.m.
